<u>Paczki Day</u> is Feb 16, the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday (It's on Thursday in Poland).

This receipe was published Feb 7, 1963 by the *Milwaukee Journal* (no vodka or rum?) 1 ½ C

Milk



2 cakes yeast

1 tsp salt

½ C sugar

3 egg yolks

1 whole egg

1 tsp vanilla

1/2 tsp mace or 1/2 tsp nutmeg

½ C butter

4 ½ C flour

Scald milk and allow to cool to lukewarm. Break yeast into lukewarm milk. Beat sugar and butter until fluffy, add eggs, salt and spices. Add flour and milk gradually, beating well. Let rise in warm place until double in bulk. (~2½ hours) Punch down, knead and let rise again. Place dough on lightly floured board, stretch toward you and fill with thick filling (jelly is not thick enough.) Fold over and cut into desired size ball, place on lightly floured surface and let rise. Fry in deep hot fat, turning only once. Doughnuts should have a very dark color before turning that they are thoroughly baked. Drain on soft absorbent paper. Sprinkle with vanilla flavored powdered sugar or mixture of granulated sugar/ cinnamon.







#### **PAST EVENTS**

#### Jan 4 –Archbishop Jerome E. Listecki



was installed as the 11th Archbishop of Milwaukee. The son of a bus driver in a SE Chicago, he attended St. Michael the Archangel Grammar School and Church E. 83<sup>rd</sup> St. & S. Shore Dr.

"Polish Cathedral Style" John Gurda, in telling about the event, wrote about Milwaukee's "Polish Church War" in the Jan. 3<sup>rd</sup> Journal Sentinel. By 1900 Poles were the second largest immigrant group, they wanted a Polish Bishop. The Kruska brothers fired "the first shots in the war. Michael was a part-time politician and full-time newspaper editor whose Kuryer Polski (Polish Courier) was the first successful Polish daily in America. Wenceslaus was a Catholic priest with literary credentials of his own...he found time to write a 13-volume history of the Poles in America....Hostilities reached their peak in 1912, when (German) Bishop Messmer formally condemned the Kurver Polski.. Two world wars, a depression and the inexorable process of assimilation dampened the ardor of the Polish partisans. Their identity never vanished, but Polish Catholics took their place as one thread in the broad weave of American Catholicism, a thread whose red and white colors grew less vivid through the years...."

Jan 22 - Grażyna Bacewicz's "Concerto for String Orchestra" was performed by the Madison's Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra. The Polish Music Center states that her 1948 composition "remains a favorite with Polish chamber orchestras and it would be great to hear it performed more often outside of Poland." Pre-concert, Sandy Tabachnick wrote in <u>Madison's Isthmus</u> that the concerto "will set the WCO string section ablaze. ..The piece is tightly structured in neo-classical style, but thorny, muscular and not for the fainthearted."

Last Feb. 5<sup>th</sup> was the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Grażyna Bacewicz's birth in Lódz to a Polish mother and Lithuanian father. After her 1932 diplomas from the Warsaw Conservatory, as Szymanowski encouraged, she studied in Paris. She was principal violinist for the Polish Radio Orchestra during the 1930s, and performed underground during the war. Her over 200 compositions paved the way for women composers. Park sculptures, plus the school and streets named for her, remind Poles of one of the most prominent Polish composers.


