# POLISH HERITAGE CLUB 0F WI - MADISON SCHOLARSHIP



Founded in 1979, the Polish Heritage Club of Wisconsin – Madison (PHCWI) was formed to promote the heritage of our Polish ancestors through educational, cultural, charitable, and social objectives including:

- Encourage among Americans, particularly Americans of Polish ancestry, an interest in and knowledge of the Polish as well as American traditions in their cultural heritage.
- Join together for social and civic activities sustaining the originality, value, and joy of Polish customs and traditions and their compatibility with American history and culture.
- Give an organized welcome in Wisconsin to artists, scholars, dignitaries, writers, musicians and other proponents of Polish-American culture.
- Promote understanding and unity among Americans of all ethnic backgrounds.
- Advance education by awarding academic scholarships
- Contribute to charitable causes.

The Polish Heritage Club of Wisconsin–Madison will award a \$500 scholarship to provide tuition assistance for students pursuing secondary education. One scholarship grant is awarded annually. The Scholarship Committee of PHCWI will review the application materials submitted by each student to ensure that criteria have been met and make recommendation for award to the PHCWI Board of Directors who approves the scholarship award to one applicant. Scholarships will be awarded following verification of enrollment in the college or university of choice by the student. Decisions of the Scholarship Committee and PHCWI-BOD are final and not subject to review.

Qualified applicants must send all of the material described in the application so that it is postmarked by March 15 of each year (faxes not accepted). Original and 5 duplicate copies of all materials must be mailed to the Polish Heritage Club of Wisconsin-Madison with Attention to Scholarship Committee. All materials submitted by applicants will become part of the records of Polish Heritage Club of Wisconsin-Madison and will not be returned. Late, incomplete or unsigned applications will not be accepted or returned for correction. # To be Eligible for Consideration:

Applicant must be a U.S. citizen or legal permanent resident

Applicant must be Wisconsin resident

Applicant must be of verifiable Polish ancestry OR studying Polish language, history, society, or culture, OR significantly engaged with Polish culture.

Applicant is enrolling or enrolled in an educational program seeking associate or bachelor's degree in any field of study at an accredited U.S. university or college.

Applicant has demonstrated excellent academic performance. Successful applicants will usually have a grade point average of at least 3.0 on a four point scale.

Applicant is seeking financial aid for education beyond high school.

Prior winners of a PHCWI Scholarship are ineligible.

Applicant will demonstrate knowledge of Polish culture.

Application Requirements (typed separately and submitted attached to application form)

**Application Form for Scholarship –** complete all sections, sign, and date.

**Essay** – (750-1000 words) write on a major event in Polish history. Explain why the topic interests you or how it relates to you personally. Include a list of the sources you consulted.

Career Plan – (150-200 words) describe your education plans, career goals, and any information that makes you a good candidate for scholarship.

**Supplemental Information** – provide verifiable Polish ancestry and exposure to Polish culture, extracurricular activities, volunteering, leadership and involvement in the community.

<u>Timeline</u>: Application must be postmarked no later than March 15 in order to be considered. All applicants and recipient will be notified by June 1. Checks to the scholarship recipient will be issued upon verification of enrollment. Recipient grants permission to publish announcement in membership newsletter and on website including recipient's name, hometown, school, major, and photograph).



"On Sunday February 13 I'll give a recital of piano works Chopin & Schubert. The featured instruments will be the Victorian English Parlor Grand and our beloved English Cottage Upright "Fred." I'll play and discuss selections from Chopin's *Nocturnes Op. 9*, and some of the Mazurkas and Preludes. Schubert works include the *Three Piano Pieces (D. 946)*, and selections from the Impromptus and *Moment Musicaux*. I will also talk about the historical tunings used on these pianos, forms of Well Temperament, and I'll discuss how temperament is related to key color. We hope you can join us!"



1840 English Upright Piano

The early 19th-century pianos designed for home use provided intimacy and poetic capability. This nstrument's poignant and gently swirling sound, famous for its vocality, is perfectly matched to the sensibility of the early romantic era ("I wandered lonely as a cloud"). Chopin's beloved studio instrument--an exquisite voice for the nocturnes, mazurkas, preludes, and waltzes.

### Chopin

\*Jan 24 MEDICAL HUMANITIES Spanish researchers, (a radiologist & a neurologist) wrote that Chopin's hallucinations may have come from temporal lobe epilepsy "they are usually brief, stereotyped and fragmentary." CHOPIN WROTE: "... I was about to play the March when, suddenly, I saw emerging from the half-open case of my piano those cursed creatures that had appeared to me on a lugubrious night at the Carthusian monastery I had to leave for a while in order to recover myself, and after that I continued playing without saying a word."

# **Opole Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra**

"Maestro Dawidow and the Opole Philharmonic Orchestra offered great melodious lines, pathos and intense playing with great Slavic spirit." --Wiener Zeitung (November 2009)

The Opole Philharmonic Symphony was established in 1952 in the capital of Upper Silesia. They perform in Wroclaw's Festival of Contemporary Music, the Chopin Festival in Duszniki, the Moniuszko Festival in Kudowa -Zdroj, Poznan Musical Spring, and Warsaw's Festival of Jewish Culture Singers. **Tyrone Greive's** Nov. 8 concert at UW-Madison celebrated the anniversary birthdays of Chopin, Wieniawski and Paderewski. His article "*The Appearance of the Violin in Poland and Italian Links to Paths of Polish Royal Patronage*" was published in the 2009 Summer issue of the Journal of the Violin Society of America: VSA Papers, Vol. XXII, No. 1. The second half of the 16<sup>th</sup> century was the "Golden Age" of violin. King Zygmunt I Stary " (King of Poland and Grand Duke of Lithuania from 1506 until 1548) was the husband of Italian born Queen Bona Sforza.

A Centennial Celebration of Roman Totenberg was held Nov. 1 at Boston's Symphony Hall. He was born Łódź on Jan. 1, 1911, and made his debut at age 12 as a soloist with the Warsaw Philharmonic Orchestra. He toured with Arthur Rubinstein, and has given joint recitals with Karol Szymanowski. For five decades Mr. Totenberg "has been a central figure in Boston's musical community....(and) his influence on classical music can be heard every day in orchestras and music schools across the nation. His extraordinary talent as a violinist has inspired a lifelong career as a teacher and mentor to countless musicians around the globe. His unfailing dedication to guiding young performers into becoming world-class artists continues to this day." A film featured remembrances by his three daughters (Nina is a NP Radio correspondent). 
