May 1st An Afternoon of Polish Music





Leah Marie Kettelkamp, violin & Carson Rose Schneider, piano Mythes, Op. 30 Karol Szymanowski (1882-1937) I. La Fontaine d'Aréthuse II. Narcisse III. Dryades et Pan The 3 Mythes, Opus 30, composed in 1915, were inspired by 3 myths from Greek mythology. They are modern sounding, but also retain some dreamy French impressionism, and are technically demanding for both violin and piano. Both instruments create different effects throughout, including splashing fountains and Pan's flute. Carson Rose Schneider, piano Sonata No. 3 in B minor, Op. 58 F. F.Chopin (1810-49) I. Allegro maestoso II. Scherzo: Molto vivace III. Largo IV. Finale: Presto non tanto; Agitato Chopin composed his Sonata No. 3 in B minor, Op. 58 in 1844. It is not only his last sonata for solo piano, but one of the few large works in his output. His longer works have been criticized for having a less coherent form, and composer Robert Schumann once referred to his Sonata No. 2 in B-Flat minor, Op. 35 as Chopin's attempts to "bind together four of his most unruly children." This Sonata No. 3 has been called an answer of those criticisms. In spite of that, one can still hear all the nuances, depth of expression, and wide array of colorful harmonies that make this work a powerful, emotional standard in the repertoire.

Poland's highest orders, the Order of Polonia Restituta, Grand Cross *Krzyż Wielki* from Poland's President Bronislaw Komorowski at the Royal Castle *Zamek Krolewski*.



After studies at the Lwów Institute of Technology Politechnika Lwowska (the only university to also receive the award), and in Gliwice and Gdansk, Poland, Dr. Szybalski was Professor of Oncology at the UW-Madison's McArdle Laboratory for Cancer Research. **On May 18-21 in Wrocław,** he attended the 4th Polish-Ukrainian Weigl Conference on Microbiology. This year's conference was dedicated to "Professor Wacław Szybalski, great geneticist and biochemist, who worked in Professor Weigl's Institute. Therefore the subtitle 'From microbiology to synthetic biology' refers to (the) discipline developed by Prof. W. Szybalski." Biologist Rudolf Stefan Weigl (1883-1957) invented the first effective vaccine against epidemic typhus. See Professor Szybalski's article "The genius of Rudolf Stefan Weigl (1883-1957), a Lvovian microbe hunter and breeder. In memoriam"

A POLAND TRIP By Miranda Hyslop-Garza

After Rusian studies in Petrozavodsk, Russia from mid-Jan. through early April, Miranda traveled for three weeks to Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Hungary, the Czech Republic and Poland. Her undergraduate degree is in international studies, and she plans to enter the Peace Corps. She is the daughter of Board of Director Janice Csyscon and member Crystal Hyslop, and has attended past club Wigilias and other events

My first view of Poland was from the bus window. With its green hills and farmland, it reminded me of Wisconsin a bit, but different. Older maybe. Brighter colors on the country houses, fields of almost neon-yellow rapeseed, peaceful and serene.

The cities I visited were majestic. The tall, tall buildings





of Warsaw and the sweet cobblestone center of Krakow are unforgettable. I walked around old Jewish districts and toured through ancient castles. I ate pierogi and chrusciki, sampled vodka and beer, and had pickles and pickled herring. I lingered in open markets, where you can buy anything from suitcases & underwear, to electrical adapters or fresh fish. I explored an old salt mine with sculptures, figures and even chapels carved entirely from salt rock.

Poland was also the place I felt the most confronted by history. It does not take long to realize the "Old Town" in Warsaw is not so old. In fact it is almost entirely rebuilt, like many cities in Poland, having been flattened in WWII. There are monuments everywhere to those





lost at war, those brave enough to revolt, and those unlucky enough to know the concentration camps. Not so distant memories of Soviet and Nazi occupation are scattered throughout the cities on plaques, in museums and on statues. I visited both Auschwitz and the Warsaw Uprising Museum. Coming as I do from such a young country, that has been so lucky to be spared the true devastation of war, I could not help but feel completely humbled by what I learned.

14 Aug 1980: "Shipyard workers in Gdansk, Poland, have staged a successful strike in protest over the dismissal of militant crane driver Anna Walentinowicz.
30 Aug 1980: Striking Polish workers won a sweeping victory in a two-month battle with their Communist rulers for the right to independent trade unions and the right to strike. The agreement means Poland becomes the first Eastern Bloc country formally to recognize an effective and independent trade union movement. The strike leader, Lech Walesa, and deputy Prime Minister Mieczyslaw Jagielski will sign the deal ending industrial action at a ceremony in Gdansk tomorrow. Under the terms of the deal, workers are also promised pay rises, better food and improved social services."




With Irena's Vow The Nathan and Esther Pelz Holocaust Education Resource Center is dedicated to Holocaust remembrance, education and the preservation of the memory of its victims. The Center aims to

promote awareness of the evils of hatred and prejudice and to inspire ethical behavior. On May 18th a performance of *Irena's Vow* was held to benefit the Center. The play, which ended its Broadway run in 2009, tells the story of Irena Gut Opdyke, (b.1919 in Kozienice) a Polish Roman Catholic, who risked her life hiding Jews in the cellar of a German army officer's home. Irena's daughter Jeannie Smith, and Milwaukee's Renaissance Theater Works producing director Julie Swanson, performed excerpts from *Irena's Vow*.

"THE CIRCLE OF FORGIVENESS Philosophers say that by saving one life, you save the world. In the case of Polish Catholic Irena Gut Opdyke, the central figure in the inspiring Broadway drama, **Irena's Vow**, her courage and compassion saved 12 Jewish lives and in doing so changed the world forever.
