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LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Greetings Everyone!

I hope all of you are having a nice summer. This is usually the slowest time of year for the PHCWI but there are a few things afoot.

First an update on the club's pursuit of non-profit status. We had originally sought 501(c)3 status but, after receiving our initial response from the IRS, we have decided to change tack and direct our application for 501(c)4 standing. If granted, the club would recognized as a non-profit group, however, donations would not be tax exempt. The board came to this decision after no small amount of discussion. It was the general feeling that after the scholarship has been ongoing for a few years, the club should consider applying for 501(c)3 status again.

Speaking of the scholarship, it is due to be awarded any day now. I am excited at the prospect of awarding the first one in PHCWI history. Along these same lines, an anonymous donor came forward last month with an offer to donate money towards the scholarship. This means that we will be able to offer a larger amount next year or perhaps multiple scholarships. The details have yet to be worked out.

Lastly I want to take a chance to remind everyone of the summer picnic which takes place on 17 July this year. As always it will be at Elver Park on Madison's west side. It is my understanding that Butch Luick will be returning to grilling duty this year so look for him with Zywiec in one hand and a pair of tongs in the other.





OLD WORLD WI HISTORIC GARDENS

The PHCWI-Madison and others worked on the Polish display at Old World, and in 1996 participated in Polish Heritage Day. The Polish garden is featured in a new book. This information is from WI Historical Society.

Old World garden coordinator Marcia Carmichael's new book *PUTTING DOWN ROOTS* tells how 19th-century settlers "brought their traditional foodways with themtheir family recipes and the seeds, roots, and slips of cherished plants-to serve as comfort food, in the truest sense..She shares timeless lessons with today's gardeners and cooks about planting trends and practices, garden tools used by early settlers, popular plant varieties, and favorite flavors of Wisconsin's early settlers, including recipes for such classics as Irish soda bread, pierogi, and Norwegian rhubarb custard..Featuring the recreated 19th century heirloom gardens at the Old World Wisconsin, *PUTTING DOWN ROOTS* is a story of holding fast to traditions while adapting to changed circumstances in an adopted home."

PUTTING DOWN ROOTS

"The twelve historical gardens at Old World Wisconsin offer a peek into the past and a treat for the senses. Based on extensive studies of 19th century sources, staff and volunteers strive to create gardens that accurately represent the time period and ethnicity of the homes they complement – in design as well as in the selection of plants. You will find gardens filled with appropriate heirloom varieties of vegetables, flowers, fruit, and herbs of varying colors, textures, flavors, and fragrances."

POLISH AREA

"Wisconsin's significant Polish population began arriving in the late nineteenth century. Many found employment in the cities. However, farm communities around Pulaski and Stevens Point soon became solidly Polish.

Kruza House Garden (1900)

In the kitchen garden flavorful beds of produce include cabbages, caraway, celeriac and kohlrabi, while petunias weave their way through potatoes. Rosemary and myrtle, long associated with Polish wedding traditions, join flowers in a small garden along the path to the home's front door."



Kurza House 1900 Hofa Park (Shawano County) – 1884. "Built of pieces of stovewood laid in a bed of motar, the structure sheltered an elderly immigrant couple. An attached room held their chickens. The Kaczorowski Outhouse was originally located on the neighboring Hofa Park farmstead. Built by a Polish farmer for his aging in-laws, the Kruza House stood within shouting distance of the larger farm-house Barbara & August Kruza had shared with their daughter's family. The house provided the elderly couple with privacy and a sense of independence, but with the security of having family nearby. Built circa 1884 in Shawano Co. the house is restored to its 1900 appearance. It embodies two distinctive European stylistic influences: its walls are built of stove woodlength logs embedded in mortar; animals & the family were sheltered in separate rooms."

THE LAPINSKI FAMILY DONATIONS

Michael Lapinski was born in 1893 in the village of Lapy, in NE Poland. The youngest in a farm family, he was raised by his older sisters after their parents died. At 15 he came to New York City, then to Ohio where an uncle lived, and finally to Rothchild, WI. He fought in France during WWI with the Polish-American Army. When he visited relatives in Poland, he left his canteen as a gift. He returned to Wisconsin and worked at Marathon Paper Mills, where he learned about sound investing from manager D.C.Everest.

Michael married Emily Iczkowski, who had worked in Chicago in sales and marketing. She was impressed that "he was driving a Model T car, and none of the other young men had cars." Raised in Bevent, WI, Emily had helped clear the land on the family farm.



She was known for her tatting and her lemon pies. After Michael passed away in 1976, she moved to Madison to be close to her daughters. She died in 2007 at the age of 101.


Their three children were raised to value education. Elsie told about their parents reading the works of Adam Mickiewicz and Henryk Sienkiewicz to them until they were old enough to read on their own.

Chester, a WWII marine veteran, became a mining and then a civil engineer, and retired from the Milwaukee Road after 33 years of service. Leona received a MA, taught in Europe, and then in the Madison area. In honor of her parents, she endowed the UW-Madison Lapinski Scholarship to support undergraduate & graduate students studying Polish language, literature, & culture. The CREECA story states "As they became leaders in Wisconsin industry, education and research, the members of the Lapinski family always recalled their Polish roots. The Lapinski Scholarship celebrates the family's legacy in the Old World and the New." http://slavic.lss.wisc.edu/new_web/?g=node/71

Elsie earned a PhD in medical microbiology and became chief of microbiology at VA Hospital. She and her friend Dr. Lois Kitze Smithies funded the purchase of 116 acres by the Madison Audubon Society near their Goose Pond Sanctuary near Arlington, WI. The former DelMonte Canning Factory land is being restored to prairie. They arranged for the installation of a large metal crane in the Lapinski-Kitze Prairie parking lot. Now "Ezzie" looks over the Goose Pond Sanctuaries.

Honorable Members of the U.S. Congress and the U.S. Senate. As a voting Polish-American constituent, I ask you to cosponsor and support the "Secure Travel and Counterterrorism Partnership Program Act," a bill that has been introduced in both chambers as H.R. 959 by Congressman Mike Quigley (IL) and as S. 497 by Senator Mark Kirk (IL) and Senator Barbara Mikulski (MD). Once enacted, this would open the way for my family's relatives in Poland to travel to the United States visa-free, as do citizens of virtually all other Nations of the European Union of which Poland is a member. I think that the time has come to put this issue to rest and let Poland experience the same rights as other European Union members.
