

"He is as pure a son of Liberty as I have ever known and of that liberty which is to go to all and not to the few or rich alone." - Thomas Jefferson

The wind gusted and clouds of snow swirled as we made our way with the crowd across the lawn to the Lincoln Street side of Kosciuszko Park in Milwaukee. Children scrambled in with hand-lettered signs in rainbow colors reading "Our Hero Thaddeus Kosciuszko" and "Kosciuszko freed the slaves."

We were there for the rededication of the Kosciuszko Monument, a massive bronze equestrian statue completed in 1905 by Italian sculptor Gaetano Trentanove and erected in a neighborhood then populated by Polish immigrants. The years took their toll. After over \$300,000 was raised by donations, and the city and county contributed an additional \$110,000 to upgrade and maintain the site, the statue was taken to Ohio for extensive restoration last February.

On this Nov. 11 - Polish Independence Day - a band played, we sang the USA and Polish national anthems, the Syrena Dancers performed, and Mayor Tom Barrett and County Executive Chris Abele spoke. Stories were told of Kosciuszko's life and the history of Milwaukee's Polonia by Donald Pienkos and John Gurda. We were convinced without a doubt that Kosciuszko was indeed a visionary and hero who fought in the American Revolutionary War, was given slaves and freed them, sold his properties and designated the funds to be used for the liberation and education of slaves. He returned to his homeland to fight for Polish independence and was instrumental in framing an edict to abolish serfdom and enfranchise Polish peasants.

Our hearts swelled with pride as we stood with our Polish American sisters and brothers alongside new Hispanic immigrants and citizens of color who now dwell where the Milwaukee Polish immigrant community originally settled. Kosciuszko would have approved of the diverse and democratic nature of this gathering in his park, a place to welcome the whole community.

"Memorializing Kosciuszko" is a 30 min. documentary produced by Milwaukee Public TV. The goal is to raise \$5,000 to bring this show to air in 2014. Thank you to Maxine Cuta who shared this story of her family's Polish customs at the 2012 Wigilia Christmas Eve on the Maciej farm in the early 1900s

Ignatz & Julia Maciej lived on a farm in the Township of Hale in Trempealeau County, Wisconsin, approximately 10 miles NE of Independence, WI. They were the parents of ten children, five girls and five boys.

My mother Agatha, the eighth child, was born in 1900. She loved to tell her children stories of life on the farm during her childhood before the conveniences of electricity, running water, in house plumbing, furnaces, and other modern conveniences that her children enjoyed. One of her favorite stories was about the preparations for Christmas Eve when she was about in the first grade. These tasks began on the first day of Advent and involved making paper cutout decorations wycinanki, folded paper decorations, straw decorations, willow weaving, preparing the crèche and maybe carving another figure, baking, making gifts, etc. For the children the most important task was to be the best behaved and most helpful, so as to be chosen by father to sit at the place of honor at the Wigilia supper. This honor was to sit next to the extra place set for the traveler who might knock on the door and ask to join the family.

On the day of Christmas Eve everyone arose early to prepare for the coming of the Christ Child. All the children had daily chores to do and there were extra tasks to be done, some assigned and others self -imposed. By mid-afternoon excitement ran high with every one attending to the usual assignments and traditions, including the younger children, who began running to the window looking for the Christmas Star, which announced the beginning of the celebration.

When the "Christmas Star" was sighted, all activities stopped and the entire family gathered around the crèche asking God and family members for forgiveness of any transgressions of the past year. This done, father would lead prayers of thanks, and ask if any one wished to offer special thanks for prayers answered. Then he announced the name and deeds of the recipient of the place of honor. This person led the family to the table, which had been set with a layer of hay under the tablecloth. Meanwhile, mother and the older girls rushed to the kitchen to bring in all of the food. Having fasted for the day, everyone was eager to get started - but not before another prayer of thanks was offered.

The meal consisted of all home grown products except for the fish, which the family had caught in the stream that ran through their property. The fish had been kept in the water tank until needed. After the meal mother and her helpers were given hugs of thanks. The younger children stretched out in the sitting room to nap, while the rest of the family prepared for the 10 mile trip to SS Peter and Paul Catholic Church, to attend midnight Mass.

After the meal father and the older boys went to the barn to prepare the horses and sleigh for the trip and made sure the lanterns were ready to light the way. They filled the wagon box with a bed of hay to insulate and cushion. Earlier the boys had added sleigh bells to the harness of the horses.

Meanwhile, mother and her helpers cleared the table adding the scraps to the hay from under the table cloth, sorting out some for each animal family to share in this special feast. The younger children not napping fed this to the animals. By the time they returned to the house, Mother and daughters had completed their house hold duties and had reset the dining table with a set of home knit socks, mittens, caps and scarves, for each family member. These plus an orange were their Christmas gifts. The knit items were made of wool from their sheep. The sheep had been sheared and the family cleaned and spun the wool into yarn and then knit it into the finished products.

It was time to wake the youngsters from their naps and get them bundled up for the trip to church. The sleigh bells could be heard coming as father drove the sleigh down from the barn. Everyone hustled to get ready. The flannel sheets had to be placed over the hay in the wagon box. Then the family all climbed in and cuddled together as father and the eldest son covered them with "pierzyny" (goose down quilts) made from the feathers of the geese they raised. Father and son, garbed in



their horse leather long coats, climbed onto the seat, tucked a sheep skin robe about their feet and legs and gave the horses the signal to get started. As they wound down the road they began to sing Christmas Hymns, joining a line of family sleighs from up the valley and adding on to the procession as they went along.

After the Mass and wishing family and friends at church a Merry Christmas, they hitched up the horses and began the trip home. The singing decreased in volume as some of the family members dropped off to sleep. The Christmas season, that lasted until the Feast of the Three Kings (Jan 6), would be a busy one, visiting all family and friends to wish them God's blessings in the New Year. Upon arriving home the little ones were tucked into bed, breakfast was prepared and another day of farm and family work, and continued celebration of Christmas traditions began.

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# IN THE NEWS 2013 from various sources

18 Sept - Nov 23, NYC - The Grolier Club's exhibit "Extraordinary Women in Science and Medicine" included Marie Curie during WWI driving to the front to X-ray wounded soldiers.

17 Oct, Madison - Ex-Mayor Dave Cieslewicz on mascots: "What if they were the Mukwonago Polacks? There was a time not so long ago when that derisive term for Poles was commonly used even in the Polish neighborhood where I grew up in on the south side of Milwaukee. And, in truth, the term can still be used without offense among my own people, just as a similarly degrading term to describe African Americans can be used among American blacks without insult while it would be a huge affront if it came from me. That's as it should be. Racial and ethnic groups get to decide for themselves what terms used to identify them are acceptable & which are offensive. It's a complicated case of history & context, it evolves..."

26 Oct, Chicago - National Public Radio WBEZ's 'Wait Wait...Don't Tell Me" apologized after host Peter Sagal and Peter Grosz answered a question about how many Poles it takes to screw in a light bulb. Polish Consul Kapuścińska said Poland's as Europe's success story "would not have been possible without the Polish intelligence and resourcefulness."

3 Nov, Krakow - Jan Matejko's bronze monument was unveiled on the 175th anniversary of the painter's birth. Pawlowo, NW POLAND - A planned 120-megawatt wind farm will help meet Poland's Kyoto Treaty agreements. 5 Nov, Warsaw - Secretary of State John Kerry met with Polish Foreign Minister Sikorski and visited Lask Air Base. Earlier he laid a wreath on the grave of Tadeusz Mazowiecki, Poland's first prime minister after the fall of communism. 7 Nov, Wrocław National Museum - The museum has ~ 200 works by Polish sculptor and fiber artist Magdalena Abakanowicz. 11 Nov, Warsaw - Independence Day clashes cost ~120,000 zloty (~30,000 euro), 72 arrested, Russian embassy attacked. 11-22 Nov, Warsaw - UN Climate Change Conference: Poland's environment minister was fired, 130 developing countries walked out of talks, and a symposium was held at Cardinal Stefan Wyszynski Univ. At the 2 day International Coal Summit, a Greenpeace banner "Who rules Poland? Coal Industry or the People?" and 1,000 people protested. ~90% Poland's electricity from coal, is 9th largest coal producer.

<u>15 Nov</u>, Tatra Mts - Researchers say 45 brown bears live in the 785 sq. km highest range in the Carpathian Mts. "...only a few bears – mostly males – specialize in destroying bee-hives." Warsaw OldTown - Construction of an office building opposite the Royal Castle near Kolumna Zygmunta was halted. UNESCO has said the building could damage the area's historic status. Jankow Przygodzki, SE of Poznan - PM Donald Tusk visited gas pipeline explosion sites - 10 homes destroyed, 2 died.

17 Nov, Unieście, NW Poland - A dead 7 meter bottlenose whale found on the beach will be examined at Hel's Marine Station 18 Nov, BBC Headquarters in London - A 'Stop Nazi Propaganda' banner protested showing of the German TV series "Our Mothers, Our Fathers" *Unsere Mütter, Väter*. Poland's Home Army (AK) is presented as a band of anti-Semites.

19 Nov, Warsaw - Prof. Henryk Skarżynski, cochlear implant pioneer received Pro Ecclesia Medal from Cardinal Nycz. 21 Nov, Ural Mts, E. RUSSIA - Poland's 1st satellite, the star measuring Lem, was launched and sent to its orbit at an altitude of ~ 800 km. It weighs 7 kg, measures 20x20 cm.
