# The Polish Heritage Club sponsored FORBIDDEN ART - chosen one of UW-Madison's Highlights of the Fall Semester

Dec 7 - "Artwork's power lies in its ability to remember the past. Sometimes, its history is one of romance and virtuosity. Other times, the story is far heavier, with the souls of the departed imbued in its lines and shapes. During its short stay in Madison, "Forbidden Art" told a story of millions' hope and despair, of their death and survival. Framed to look like a death camp's barracks, "Forbidden Art" showcased works made from the strife and pain of Auschwitz-Birkenau reclaimed at the end of World War II. While the works were represented through photos (the originals were too fragile for travel), they carried the weight of people living through tragedy; shreds of hope amidst lines of defeat. The memory of the survivors lives on through the works recovered from Auschwitz's walls, creating a powerful, yet humble exhibition." -Michael Frett

**2014 Nov 10-14** Bill *McGlaughlin's Exploring Music: Poland* on WI Public Radio's Classical Programming: "the history of Poland through the eyes of her best composers"

*Program 1* "Bill opens this show with music of Chopin, who most people consider the preeminent composer of the country. We hear some early hymnal music of the 13th cen. before moving in the 16th and 17th centuries, which brought the migration of the Jewish people following the Spanish Inquisition. We close with another piece from Chopin.

*Program 2* We pick up in the 17th century during a period of conflict. We hear a sonata performed by the Capella Gedanensis & a performance by the Lira Singers, based in Chicago. We hear music from Franciszek Lessel, Chopin's teacher Józef Elsner and female composer Maria Szymanowska.

*Program 3* We continue with the music of Frédéric Chopin and Stanisław Moniuszko. While Chopin's music is renowned, the work of Moniuszko remains mostly in Poland. We hear Moniuszko's Halka, considered Poland's national opera, as well as a polonaise and mazurka from Chopin.

*Program 4* Bill continues with composers who came after...We hear music from Henryk Wieniawski, Maurycy Moszkowski and Juliusz Zarebski, all from the mid-19th century. We then move to Ignacy Jan Paderewski with his Concerto for Piano in A Minor and Minuet. We end with music from Leopold Godowsky played by Jascha Heiftz.

*Program 5* We open with Szymanowski's *Stabat Mater* continue with music from Lutosławski. Bill returns to Paderewski before closing with a traditional Polish song and polka."

Krzysztof Komeda (nee Trzcinski) was an important member of the modern jazz scene in his native Poland and throughout Europe until his death in 1969. His scores for films by Roman Polanski and

Hennig Carlsen created a uniquely European sound in modern jazz and film scores. Prof. Adam Gaines will illuminate some of Komeda's most important contributions through the use of film clips and lecture. His music will be performed by UWGB professors Adam Gaines and John Salerno with the Nothing But Swing Trio, who are experts on Komeda's music.

From the "hoof beats of Polish cavalry" to the "wind over the graves," Chopin's music has always inspired fantastical imagery and even stories in the imaginations of his listeners. Though the composer always insisted his work was pure and abstract, clues to hidden narratives abound. Chopin alludes to opera, dance, sacred music and

many other contemporary styles. In this lecture-recital, UWGB faculty member and pianist Michael Rector explores these allusions and how Chopin combines them to guide his listener on a musical journey.

## October 2014 - The Center for Russia, East Europe, and

**Central Asia (CREECA)** was one of seven UW-Madison international centers receiving federal Title VI grants from the U.S. Department of Education. They will share \$3.4 million for the 2014-15 academic year, nearly \$13.7 million through 2018. Title VI of the Higher Education Act 1965 provides funding for international studies. CREECA will use the grant "to support the teaching of advanced Polish, advanced Turkish/Azeri, and elementary through advanced-level Kazakh. Funding will also go to support: interdisciplinary courses in Russia, Eastern, Central Europe, Central Eurasia, workshops for K-12 teachers around the state of Wisconsin, and public outreach events in and around Madison... lectures, films, and symposia. Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) fellowships will be awarded to graduate and undergraduate students for instruction in Slavic, Eastern European, and Central Eurasian languages."
