The Polish celebration follows a week of fasting and penance, and on the day before Easter, tradition dictates that samples of the holiday foods be taken to the local priest to be blessed. Sunday brunch begins a two-day festival of feasting and social gatherings. These young Polish-Americans, dressed in bright shawls and vests of their heritage, gather around a table laden with all the traditional holiday treats: colored eggs, ham, cheese, bread, pastries, kielbasa and a lamb made of butter.

March 17: Mazurki Making Class

The English word "mazurka" (derived from Polish "mazurek" plural "mazurki") is well known around the world as the name of Polish folk dance and at least 59 Chopin's piano compositions inspired by the dance. But few people know that the word has also other meanings in Polish and one of them is reserved for the lip-smacking cakes traditionally prepared for Easter.

Easter Mazurki (Mazurki Wielkanocne) grace every Polish table with **Easter Babki** (Babki Wielkanocne). However, babki are consumed in Poland all year long, while mazurki are a seasonal treat that is hard to find at times other than Easter. Moreover, babki have some "relatives" in other cuisines, while mazurki remain a distinctively Polish specialty. In addition to their great taste, this uniqueness is another good reason to learn how to make them for all interested in Polish traditions.



Typical mazurki are flat, relatively thin and usually rectangular cakes that come in endless variety of flavors and complexity levels. The scrumptiousness comes mostly from luscious fillings spread over a pastry base and other goodies used to enrich and decorate the cake. The toppings are often made of chocolate, nuts and/or poppy

seeds but a caramel fudge cream called kajmak is perhaps the most popular. Bearing clear similarity to the Turkic word kaymak, its name reflects the Middle Eastern influence on mazurki starting to appear on the tables of Polish nobility in the XVIII century.

Many recipes call also for a layer of fruit preserves, meringue, marzipan or even a sponge cake. Needless to say, the most elaborate, multilayer creations are called the **Royal Mazurka** (Mazurek Królewski). Simple or intricate, the cake is usually richly decorated with nuts and dried or candied fruits. Tiny lambs, rabbits, chicks and flowers made from chocolate, marzipan or pastry dough are also popular additions, while some mazurki are even inscribed with seasonal greetings.

There are also some choices when it comes to the pastry base. The most popular variety is often compared to shortbread but it is actually more crumbly and tastes deliciously on its own. To learn some tricks for making the yummy pastry and indulge your creative streak in mazurki decorating, join our class given on March 17, 2018. Mazurki are fun to make - especially with children or grandchildren and everybody will enjoy this new addition on your table.

Team Poland Roller Derby World Cup

Kara is PR Mgr. for Madison's Mad Rollin' Dolls. March 3 is their 'Lord of the Rinks' theme event at Alliant Energy Ctr.

The 3rd Blood & Thunder Roller Derby World Cup was held in Manchester, United Kingdom from February 1-4th. Thirtyeight teams from around the globe came together to compete for bronze, silver, and gold.

Team Poland was one of a handful of teams making their first World Cup appearance. Poland's team was made up of 20 skaters from multiple countries, including: Poland, Scotland, Norway, United Kingdom, Sweden, Ireland and the US. All 20 skaters were either Polish citizens or of Polish descent. At least half of the team were directly from Poland, where the sport of roller derby has only taken root in the last 3-4 years (for perspective, roller derby in its modern iteration has been around for 15 years). Since Team Poland's members were fairly spread out, the training session on January 31st was the first time most skaters got a chance to work together. Many other teams competing at the World Cup have had team rosters and practices for the last 18 months.

Team Poland's first game was against Team Japan in a 30 minute mini-game. Poland got their first win of the tournament with a score of 102-53. Later that day, Poland faced another team making their first appearance, Team Costa Rica and took another win—287-28. Team Poland finished the first day ranked 21st out of 38, and had the 6th highest total score differential of the games that day. *~Team photo by Krzysztof Jaros*



The next day, Team Poland faced a team that had played in the World Cup before, Team West Indies. This was a tougher match-up, and after 60 min. of game play, Team Windies had the win, 185-92. Finally, on Saturday, Poland had what was likely their final game of the tournament against Team Norway. It was a challenging game, but also, it was agreed that it was the most fun game the team had. Norway won 285-131. With only the Top 16 teams playing on Sunday, this effectively ended Team Poland's game time at the tournament. Team Poland overall ranked 29th out of the 38 teams there.

The entire team, managers, and coaching staff are incredibly proud of the team's efforts. We can only imagine what Team Poland can do in the next World Cup (likely in 2020). Team Poland would also like to thank its sponsors and partners: Sisu Mouthguards, S1 Helmets, Proton, Hoodlum Fang, and Just One Body. And a massive thank you to all of our fans- we could not have done this without you! **#pierogipower!**

The workshop will look at the history and the politics of nationalism in the post-War and Cold War eras, and how populism is coming back into fashion in both Europe and the US since the Fall of the Berlin Wall (1989). Participants will examine the crises that led to a surge in nationalism (such as globalization and the refugee crisis) and how populist tactics from both the left and right ends of the political spectrum are hampering the day to day workings of political life (Germany, Spain, the US, the Netherlands). Educators will also look at the history of why certain countries and areas of Europe and the US are more susceptible to nationalist leanings than others."
