The time in and around New Year is excitedly awaited by everyone in the Poland. New Year's Day, out of its traditional relevance, is also called as St. Sylvester's Eve. According to legends, it is associated with Pope Sylvester I, who supposedly caught a dragon named Leviathan. On the first date of the year of 1000, the dragon was able to get himself liberated from Pope Sylvester's regime, and went on to demolish land, people, as well as set fire to the heavens. However, the dragon was later caught again, and world still survived itself on the New Year's Day. In the commemoration of the same, people started celebrating and rejoicing the New Year's Day as St. Sylvester's Day. ...the core of New Year celebrations in Poland quotes that no one should be lonely for the day. It is not necessary the way they celebrate it, but the important thing is that one has to feel good and be optimistic. There is also a tradition of wishing at least one person good by saying, "do siego roku", which refers to "I wish you well".

Joanna directed by Feliks Falk (2010) 105 min. *The eponymous heroine of this World War II drama is a bright and wary young Pole who is struggling to survive in Nazi-occupied Warsaw. As she awaits her soldier-husband's return from the front, Joanna's world is turned inside out upon discovering a seven-year-old Jewish girl hiding in a church.*

Filming on historic locations in Gdynia, Krauze forcefully brings to the screen a rarely depicted yet pivotal chapter in Polish history.*

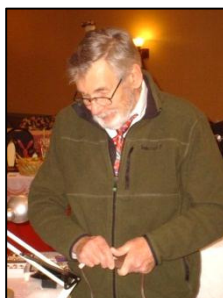

Joanna's Genealogy by Joanna Pasowicz

At our Bazaar the question most asked was, "How do we start on our genealogy?" The answer is to start with your parents. Use separate sheets for each of them and their subsequent lines. First ask the names of their parents and then their brothers and sisters, along with their birthdates and marriage dates.

If the grandparents are alive, ask them the same questions, and the names of their brothers & sisters. Also ask where they were born. If in a foreign country, when did they come to this country? Was there a reason for the immigration? Do the same for all the Aunts and Uncles. Try to interview as many as you can. You can use a tape recorder or a video camera to help. Then start looking for old photos, i.e. weddings, reunions, other family get togethers.

Wheelchairs for Krakow University Hospital

Judith Rapacz is still collecting \$\$ for 2 wheelchairs she and Jan plan to deliver to Karkow's University Hospital.

From her Oct. newsletter story:

"The Traumatology unit had 6 rooms with a total of 30 beds. There were mainly emergency cases, such as broken arms, legs etc. There were only 2 wheelchairs for the 30 patients, so those that could manage to go to the bathroom always had to wait until a nurse could retrieve one of the chairs. Therefore my mission is to collect funds to purchase 2-3 wheel chairs at the cost of Zł 800, equal to about US \$ 300. The chairs are produced in Belgium, but assembled in Poland so this will also support the Polish economy. If you care to contribute you may send a check to me at 5701 Tolman Terrace, Madison, WI 53711 – every dollar counts."

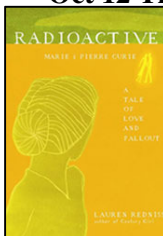

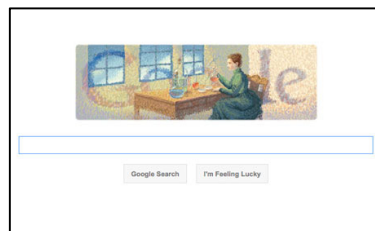
