

"highlights both the scientific work of Marie and Pierre Curie and articles about them in publications aimed at the general public. ... The dates stamped within the volumes of such publications show that the University of Wisconsin library received many of them quite quickly, sometimes within just a few weeks of their publication in Europe – this, at a time when such European publications reached Madison by a combination of ship and rail. The exhibit also includes a sampling of mainly American publications from the 1920s and 1930s illustrating the place of Marie and Pierre Curie in the public eye (and the public imagination). All of the volumes on display and Pierre and Marie Curie with their bicycles...are from the holdings of Memorial Library."

Fallout: The Mixed Blessing of Radiation & the Public Health - 750 Highland Ave Nov 1- April 1, 2013 Historical Reading Room and 3rd Floor Gallery Ebling Library, Health Sciences Learning Center

"Fallout" is an examination of subjects such as the early use of x-rays in diagnosis & treatment, occupational hazards of working with radiation, the military use of x-rays, the history of tanning, a UW connection with Marie Curie, bomb shelters in the 1960's, the bombing of Hiroshima and concerns with nuclear accidents like Three-Mile Island, UW's Departments of Medical Physics and Radiology, shoe fitting fluoroscopes and the like. The exhibit is supported by artifacts, journals, books, and other ephemera from Ebling's Rare Books & Special Collections and materials from other campus libraries and UW's Radiology Department."

Some of the stories Susan told.....

- -80% of WI's Poles came from Prussia. Most were peasants coming for ecomonic reasons, "for bread za chlebem. After Wisconsin had jobs available.
- -Milwaukee had 18 Polish churches, St Josaphat's the largest. "Polish flats" were houses jacked up to build a basement. Kaszubian fishermen settled on Jones Island.
- -Polonia, Portage Co: When saloons refused to close during services, Fr. Dąbrowski moved the church.
- -Hofa Park west of Green Bay was the origin of Old World Wisconsin's stovewood Kruza House.
- -Trempealeau Co.'s Poles came from 2 Silesian villages.
- The diary of Maciej Wojda tells about his life in Poland, voyage to Milwaukee in 1868 and life in Wisconsin.

TRANSFERRING PHOTOS TO FABRIC - PRESERVING FAMILY HISTORY

- · Scan selected photos into computer, select "photo" and "best quality";
- Open scanned photo in browser, Picasa, Photoshop, or use software from your camera; sharpen, trim, enhance colors, change to sepia, etc.;
- Printing option 1: Print on inkjet transfer paper with inkjet printer (Epson, Canon and HP best); follow direction from your specific paper and iron onto fabric (100% cotton best) or other media;
- Printing option 2: Print directly on fabric using professionally prepared fabric or prepare your own with Bubble Jet Set;
- Treat transferred images following directions from chosen media to stabilize prints; images can be permanent and washable depending on chosen media;
- Use transferred images for quilts, wall hangings, pillows, place mats, tote bags, jigsaw puzzles, etc.

The Polish program at UW-Madison is the oldest Polish program in the United States. from the Department website:

History Instruction in Slavic languages and literature at the University of Wisconsin-Madison traces its roots back to 1935, when state legislators and leaders of the Polish-American community demanded that the University begin to offer Polish. They managed to get funds for a department added to the state budget as a separate item from the regular University budget, and the Department of Slavic Languages & Literature was born in 1936 as the Department of Polish. Instruction in Polish began in 1936 and continues to this day.

In its first three years, the Department of Polish was led successively by Witold Doroszewski and Jozef A. Birkenmajer, both of whom came from Poland to chair the one-teacher department. In 1939, chairmanship passed to Edmund Zawacki, the first person in America to have earned a Ph.D. in Slavic Languages (Harvard University, 1941), who served until 1960. [Dr. Zawacki was a Polish Heritage Club founder.]



Polish Community 1907-1947

"In its heyday, Milwaukee's Polish-American community was among the largest in the United States. The first Polish inhabitant arrived as early as 1842, & by the turn of the century Polish-Americans formed the 2nd largest ethnic group in the city. Most settled in a four-square mile area on the South Side known

Studio photographer Roman B.J. Kwasniewski, the son of Polish immigrants, created a rich visual record of his community in the years between World War I and II. From his studio on Lincoln Avenue, Kwasniewski captured important events in the lives of thousands of Polish-Americans: First Communions, confirmations, graduations, weddings, and anniversaries.

Endangered Time, chemical instability, and the medium's own

inherent fragility have caused the Roman Kwasniewski photographic collection's continuous deterioration to its current distressed state. In order to save these important images, the UWM Libraries is undertaking a project to scan the entire collection and post a selection of the best images on the Web. This project will require resources beyond what the UWM Libraries has available. Private support is sought from individuals, foundations, and other funding sources to meet these goals. Sept 17 Vistula River, Warsaw Due to lowest water levels in 200 years, archeologists are now able to find looted elaborate marble stonework from Swedish barges that sunk 400 years ago. Sept 20 Geneva, Switzerland Prof. Agniezka Zalewska is the first Pole & first woman to head the atomic research center CERN.

Nov 8 Katowice General Motors obtained a permit to produce the Opel Astra V, launch due in 2015.

It was a miracle and that's all there is to it. I've never been a religious man before, but I am now."

Nov 15 Warsaw's Chopin airport The first of Poland's eight new Boeing 787 Dreamliner aircraft arrived from Everett, WA. Nov 16 release of movie LINCOLN. Rep. Thaddeus Stevens (Tommy Lee Jones) was named after Polish hero Kosciuszko. The movie's cinematographer Polish born Janusz Kaminski has photographed all of Steven Spielberg's movies since 1993.


