POLES AND THE U.S. CIVIL WAR

Were any of your ancestors in the U.S. Civil War? Polish immigrants arrived in Wisconsin in the mid-1850s. Between 1861-1865, more than 91,000 young men left Wisconsin to fight in the South. About 4,000 Poles served in the Union Army. The most prominent, Wladimir Krzyzanowski, organized a volunteer unit of Poles and Germans in NY, the 58th New York Infantry regiment, known as "the Polish Legion".

The Wisconsin Historical Society has collected Civil War materials for more than 150 years. "The Library and Archives own nearly 10,000 books and pamphlets, 1,300 manuscript collections, and more than 2,000 historical photographs, broadsides, and

maps...rosters, casualty lists, memoirs, regimental histories... Roster of WI Volunteers War of the Rebellion 1861-1865. Alphabetical and regimental lists of soldiers who served in Wisconsin units during the Civil War.

The Iron Brigade "The Iron Brigade was Wisconsin's most famous war unit. They fought in the Army of the Potomac, suffering unusually high casualties at Gainesville, Antietam (the Civil War's bloodiest battle), and Gettysburg. Many of Wisconsin's regiments were composed primarily of single ethnic groups. For example, the 9th, 26th, 27th, and 45th were mainly Germans, while Norwegians filled the ranks of the 15th regiment. The 8th Wisconsin became known as the Eagle Regiment because of a pet bald eagle, named Old Abe, that they carried into battle on a perch with an American flag. Old Abe, according to legend, had been captured by an American Indian on the Flambeau River. Until Old Abe's death in 1881, he enjoyed a wide celebrity at soldiers' reunions and fairs."

Arthur Zajkowski is the artistic director of the *Fantini Akord Quintet*. Major achievements of the group include first place awards in many European cities. They have performed in China and at the General Audience of Pope Benedict in 2006. During their current tour, they play at The Twin Cities Polish Fest and the Polish Center of WI. They play classical music ("Gothic Suite" – L. Boellmanna, "Aria from suite No. 3" – JS Bach, or "Adagio in G minor" T. Albinoni), through jazz standards ("One note samba "), and pop music (marches, polkas, waltzes French), to popular music, and dance.

Koszalin (pop. 109,183) is the largest city of Middle Pomerania in north-western Poland. It is located 12 km south of the Baltic Sea coast. A famous view is the Chełmska hill, a site of pagan worship in prehistory. Pope John Paul II consecrated a tower on the hill and it is now a pilgrimage site. Koszalin's most distinctive landmark is St. Mary's cathedral from the early 14th century.

Volosi is a string quintet from southern Poland; they play Capathian string music, a mix of highlander's, Gypsy, klezmer & Balkan influences with classical virtuosity & the energy, diversity & passion of a village wedding band from central Europe.

*From SZYMON WOZNICZKA.....*VOLOSI is a rising star among world music bands in Europe. They finally emerged fully formed on the Poland's folk scene in 2010, as a result of many line-up and name changes. They are a string quintet (some-times using also "gajdy" a local type of bagpipe), largely instrumental, hailing from S. Poland - Silesia and from Beskid Mtns.

On one hand we have two classical musicians, the brothers Krzysztof and Stanislaw Lason – violin and cello players respectively and graduates of The Karol Szymanowski Academy of Music in Katowice, whose dream has always been improvisation, and who share the love of folk music for all its' spontaneity, vitality and beauty. On the other hand, we have three highlanders. They are self-taught and very seasoned musicians. They are from three neighboring villages: Istebna, Koniakow and Jaworzynka, where the boarders of Poland, Slovakia and Czech Republic meet.



Out of the meeting of these five musical personalities, a certain 'something' was born, similar to what inspired the world a hundred years ago, when jazz was born. This 'something' is best described by the word 'drive'. Zbigniew Michalek (violin), Jan Kaczmarzyk viola, bagpipes) and Robert Waszut (double-bass) bring a Carpathian note with multiple musical expres-sions, which reach back to the Indian, Persian, Balkanian, Hungarian, Romanian, Ukrainian, Slovakian roots that all tangle here.

To most, this music will sound somehow familiar, and yet, at the same time, they will admit that they have never heard anything quite similar before. How can this style be characterized and classified? Perhaps as an eruption of energy that comes from great experience of making music together. Perhaps as exploring the deep layers of the human soul, to which only music can reach. Or, perhaps as the search for primary force that drove a man to create music. Finally, as the play sounds – improvisation on the border between different musical worlds. Undoubtedly, the essence of this music is a meeting of people from the realms of music that is 'written', and music that is 'heard'. *www.volosiband.com Also scheduled to play in Milwaukee's Shank Hall, and in Minneapolis.*

Arthur Szyk: An Artist at War www.wisvetsmuseum.com Arthur Szyk shick (b.1894, Łódź. d.1951, CT), graphic artist and book illustrator, used medieval and renaissance painting traditions in his caricatures of Axis leaders. He studied in Paris and at the Jan Matejko Academy of Fine Arts, Kraków. During the Polish–Soviet War (1919–1920) he was a cavalry officer and artistic director of the propaganda department of the Polish army in Łódź. He has become well-known thru exhibits of his work, a biography, a documentary film, and the Arthur Szyk Society.



"His caricatures became daily fare in newspapers and magazines through-out the United States. In 1942 alone, Szyk's war-driven cartoons were published in Esquire, Collier's, Look, Liberty, Time, the Saturday Review of Literature, and the Saturday Evening Post. One magazine reported that Szyk cartoons were as popular as Betty Grable pin-ups for troops heading overseas.....

As an artist with a love of history, Szyk appreciated the power that symbols, myths, and heroes had in Polish and Zionist political cultures, and he made full use of those resources to convey his message."

24/25 June, Ashton/Sun Prairie, WI parishes - Displays from Treasurers of the Church included St. Faustina Kowalska relics. 28 June - 7 July, Krakow - The 23th Jewish Culture Festival, focused in Kazimierz, had over 200 events and 154 artists.

5 July, Wimbledon, England - 6'8" Jerzy Janowicz, the first Polish man to reach a grand slam semifinal in tennis history, lost to the eventual winner Andy Murray 6-7, 6-4, 6-4, 6-3. In the quarter-final Janowicz beat fellow Pole Lukasz Kubot.

6 July, Warsaw - A protest banner read 'May you live 100 years – in prison' at Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski's 90th birthday party.
