**JUNE- AUG. at 1 W.Wilson St. Pat Hall's decorated eggs** are on display in the 1st Floor Display Case - from the front reception desk, turn left. Pat has demonstrated egg decorating and other crafts at our club's Spring Festival & Nov. Bazaar. "I created these eggs using the Ukrainian wax-resist method. Alternating layers of wax and dyes are applied to the egg. Then, after the wax is removed, the multi-colored design is revealed. The large eggs on display are ostrich eggs, and the smaller ones are goose eggs. Some of the motifs in the designs are very traditional, dating back to pre-Christian times. Decorated eggs were used as talismans for protection and good fortune. I have been doing eggs such as this for about 30 yrs." The Artwork 1 West Wilson website has pictures of 5 of the eggs.

Since 2009 when a group of Department of Health Services (DHS) employees started the program, five display areas are available in the art deco historic State Office Building. The exhibits are displayed for 3 or more months. Artists are welcome to sell their pieces after the display period. Artwork in all kinds of media: paintings, photographs, collages, drawings, beadwork, woodworking, sculptures, pottery, etc.is welcome by artists connected to DHS such as:

"Sept. 1940. Polish Army officer Witold Pilecki deliberately walked into a Nazi German street round-up in Warsaw and became Auschwitz Prisoner No. 4859. He had volunteered for a secret undercover mission: smuggle out intelligence about the new German concentration camp, and build a resistance organization among prisoners. Pilecki's clandestine intelli-gence, received by the Allies in 1941, was among the earliest. Dramatic eyewitness report, written in 1945 for Pilecki's Polish Army superiors, - amazon.com

Pilecki (b.1901 Olonets, Russia d.1948 Warsaw) was a member of the 211th Uhlan Regiment when he fought in the 1920 Battle of Warsaw. During WWII he was a cavalry-platoon commander. Fall 2014: release of a docudrama staring actor Marcin Kwasny as Witild Pilecki. # Marie Curie Died 80 years ago on July 4, 1934

One of the two Polish Heritage Club's 2013 Scholarship recipients, Carolyn Hayney is attending UW Madison, majoring in French and Spanish while on the premed track. She met some members at last summer's club picnic. Best wishes, Carolyn, for a good summer, and the year ahead! Carolyn's essay is below, the other to be pub. later.

Marie Curie (née Maria Salomea Sklodowska) was born in Warsaw, Poland on November 7, 1867. Both of her parents were teachers, and they fed a desire for knowledge in each of their five children. She received some basic science-based training from her father. Marie was a bright girl, finishing at the top of her class; she faced many educational obstacles as a girl. She was not allowed to attend the all-male University of Warsaw. In order to continue her education, she attended underground classes, all held in secret. Marie and her sister longed to pursue higher education, and eventually, Curie moved to Paris, France in 1891 to continue her studies at the Sorbonne. At the university, she earned her degree in physics in 1893 and a degree in mathematics in 1894.

Eager to begin her scientific research, she sought out a laboratory in which to work. A colleague introduced her to physicist, Pierre Curie. The two worked side by side and eventually developed a romance. They were married in 1895. The couple had two daughters, Irene in 1897 and Eve in 1904. They continued to work together in the lab, discovery both polonium, named after Marie's homeland: Poland, and radium. Marie began to study "radioactivity", an idea first presented by the French physicist, Henri Becquerel, who discovered that uranium gave off rays. Marie studied these rays and theorized that they must come from the structure of the atom of the element. She called this phenomena radioactivity, coining this common scientific word.

Her work with radioactivity earned her a Nobel Peace Prize in physics in 1903, along with her husband, Pierre, and Henri Becquerel. She was the first woman to be awarded a Nobel Prize and Curie used the money to continue her research. In 1906, Marie became a widow when Pierre passed away after being hit by a horse-drawn wagon. She took over his teaching job at the Sorbonne, becoming the university's first female professor. In 1911, Curie received the honor of a second Nobel Peace Prize, this time in chemistry for the discovery of polonium and radium. She became the first scientist to win the Nobel Prize twice.

In 1914, when World War I broke out, Curie began to turn her work more towards aid for the war effort. She created portable x-rays that could be used in the battle field. These machines received the nickname "Little Curies". With all the fame her work received, Curie took time to travel after the war. She continued to raise money for her research. Eventually, her work began to take a toll on her health. Marie Curie died on July 4, 1934 of aplastic anemia caused by constant exposure to radiation. Her legacy lives on, inspiring scientists, especially women, all over the world.

Marie Curie and radioactivity are two subjects I find fascinating. Marie Curie and I have a lot in common other than our Polish ancestry. She worked in the science field, and I plan to be on the premed track in college. Curie lived, studied, and worked in France. I hope to do the same someday. I have studied French for several years, and I plan to continue with the language throughout my post-secondary education. My dream is to live and study abroad, perhaps in France, just like Marie Curie.

It is not just our similarities that draw me to such an influential Pole like Marie Curie. I also greatly admire her passion and determination as a woman. She lived and worked in a world where males were seen as far superior beings. She did not let her gender get in the way of her dreams and eventual successes. I am an advocate for gender equality, and I firmly believe we are all created equal. Marie Curie broke through gender barriers becoming the first woman to win a Nobel Prize, and she became the first female professor at the prestigious Sorbonne University. The respect and honors she gained from the scientific community were astounding. The response she received demonstrates the impact of her work on the scientific world. Marie Curie is very accomplished, and even though she was a woman, she received the respect she deserved.

I admire Marie Curie for her hard work and desire to learn. She left her home in order to pursue an education, and I plan on doing the exact same thing next year. Marie Curie is truly an amazing woman. She is one of the most inspirational women in history and she calls Poland home.

# **IN THE NEWS** from various sources

<u>31 May</u> - Cologne, GERMANY - Poland's Young Musician of the Year, player Bartosz Kołsut represented Poland in the finals of the Eurovision Young Musicians Competition.

<u>26 May</u> - Warsaw - 10 charged for possession,  $\sim$  3,000 marched for decriminalization and legalization of marijuana

- Krakow - 70% voted no, so 2020 Olympics bid withdrawn.

<u>27 May</u> - - Pilawa Gorna, Lower Silesia - A Krakow University scientist discovered a new mineral *Pilawit/* Pilavite in a mine.

<u>28 May</u> - Donetsk, E. UKRAINE - Pro-Russian separatists kidnapped a priest due to say a 'Mass for peace' in Constitution Square.

<u>29 May</u> - Polish-Belarusian border - A 3rd wild boar (dead in a river) tested positive for African Swine Fever.

- Krakow - Supporters want funds to renovate the Kossakowka Manor, home of celebrated painter Juliusz Kossak and family.

<u>30 May</u> - Glucholazy, S. Poland - After floods, PM Tusk promised 6000 zloty/household. A fire engine fell into a collapsed rd. hole.

4 June - Freedom Day Celebrations in Warsaw:

- Royal Castle Square Pres. Obama spoke to a crowd of 6,000.
- Kordegarda Gallery "Solidarite France Pologne" exhibition.

- Royal Castle banquet - Mustafa Dzhemilev, leader of Crimean

Tatars, was presented with the inaugural *Solidarity Award*. - Park Fontann - 12,000 watched *Dance of Freedom /Taniec Wolnosci*: dancers, acrobats, and multimedia projection of Polish post WWII history, ended with fireworks.

<u>6 June</u> - Lower house of Parliament, Warsaw - 7 hunger strikers were expelled for protesting wind farms. They want to forbid their construction within 3km of residences.

 $\underline{9 \text{ June}}$  - Pomeranian Lake District, NW Poland - 3 drowned in separate incidents during a spell of warm weather.

<u>10 June</u> - Gulf of Gdansk ~ 230 sailors from 25 countries began competition in World Masters Championship Sailing Race. - Bolkow, NW Poland - An 8 x 5.3cm meteorite, found in 2013 in a Neolithic hut, may have been used for shamanic purposes.

<u>11 June</u> - Helsinki, SWEDEN - Polish computer programmers team crowned the World Computer Coding Champions.
Jagiellonian University, Krakow - Historian Norman Davies gave the keynote speech of the 7th Polish-British Roundtable.
Israel's Yad Vashem institute - Israeli Ambassador to Poland, Zri Rav-Ner, posthumously honored 3 Polish priests and 2 nuns.

<u>12 June</u> - Donetsk, E. UKRAINE - Poland "temporarily" closed its Consulate & told Polish citizens to leave the region immediately.

<u>13 June</u> - Poland's defense spending will increase from 1.95 to 2% of GDP. That equals ~ 800 million zloty/200 million Euro. - Congress Hall, Warsaw - Singer-songwriter Tori Amos played piano& organ, gave her support to the Warsaw Equality Parade and said, "Every time I am in Poland I feel at home."

<u>16 June</u> - Warsaw ~ 8,000 marched in the 14th Equality Parade's slogan 'Equal rights – a common cause' for civil partnerships. - In 2013 farmers' incomes rose 7% vs. 0.4% for rest of society.

<u>17 June</u> - Tempel Synagogue, Kazimierz, Krakow - For the first time since WWII, the new Rabbi of Krakow, Eliezer Gurary, was nominated by the head of the local Jewish community.

<u>22 June</u> - Warsaw - PM Tusk threatened early elections after *Wprost* magazine's secret recordings of plotting by the central bank's chief and a government minister. *Wprost* also quoted Foreign Minister Sikorski who said 'the Polish-American alliance is worthless.'
