35th Anniversary of the PHCWI-Madison

The club's first Wigilia was in 1979. Michael Lomperski had placed an advertisement in the WI State Journal for individuals interested in forming a Polish Club in Madison. On February 29, 1980 the Articles of Incorporation were signed by Edmund Zawacki, Michael Lomperski and Walter Chojnowski. Attorney Stephen M. Sobota drafted and notarized the document. The initial Board of Directors were: Edmund Zawacki (the Registered Agent), Helen Zawacki, Michael Lomperski, Stephen M Sobota, Walter Chojnowski, Alberta Chojnowski, Eva Hann, Lillian Vallee, and Lydia Wojtowicz. On March 3, 1980 The Polish Heritage Club of Wisconsin, Inc. -Madison Group was registered with the State of Wisconsin under the provisions of Chapter 181 of the Wisconsin Statues as a without stock and not for profit corporation. Vel Phillips was Secretary of State at the time. Dane County Register of Deeds Carol R. Manke signed a duplicate document on March 4, 1980.

"Casimir Pulaski was born in Poland [Mar. 6?] 1747. He came to America in 1777, after fighting for Poland's independence, and joined forces with General Washington. After saving Washington's life, Pulaski was made brigadier general of the American Cavalry. Wounded in battle, Pulaski died October 11, 1779. Enacted April 30, 1987, Laws of WI, Act 11."

<u>Pulaski, WI</u> celebrates Casmir Pulaski Day, this year March 2, by asking all to wear red. Participating businesses receive a balloon. The Pulaski Historical Museum is open for tours.

Savannah, GA March 7, 2015 (RSVP WAS DUE JAN. 31) Pulaski Committee Commemorative 270th Birthday Ceremony

"The Commemoration will be held in Savannah at Monterey Square (corner of Bull and West Taylor Streets). This is the site of General Pulaski's burial and monument erected in his name acknowledging the great contribution and ultimate sacrifice he made for this country....Following the ceremony, we would like to invite everyone to join us at the Plantation Club at The Landings on beautiful Skidaway Island for a hot luncheon buffet which will be held from noon to 4 p.m. Fort Pulaski (a Historical National Park), and the beautiful beaches of Tybee Island are only about 30 minutes away. ..."

".. Pulaski, founding commander of the U. S. Cavalry, died at the age of 34 during the Revolutionary War's Siege of Savannah. The young member of Polish nobility had sympathized with the new nation's struggle against oppression. He had been a freedom fighter in Poland and joined the American Revolutionary War at the behest of Benjamin Franklin. In the battle that took his life, Pulaski commanded the entire cavalry, both French and American. Grapeshot from a British cannon mortally wounded him when he attempted to cross enemy lines, about a half-mile north of Monterey Square. The shot is on display at Georgia Historical Society. Subsequently, Pulaski was made an honorary United States citizen."

Edward Pulaski saved 45 men when he ordered them to stay in a mine shaft during a huge 1910 forest fire in Idaho. That tunnel is on the National Register of Historic Places, and the tool he invented is still in use as basic firefighting equipment. He may have been a great-grandnephew of Kazimierz Pulaski. http://culture.polishsite.us/articles/art451.html

Madison Encounters in Bożków, Lower Silesia – English Language Teaching and Learning Experiences in Lower Silesia 2014: Some Personal Perspectives on Polish Education Policy, Public/Private Partnering and Popular Aspirations

Gina and Eric Lewandowski, a husband and wife team, have a long-standing personal and professional interest in the dynamics of intercultural affairs. Gina, a Ph.D. candidate in Curriculum & Instruction at the University of Wisconsin- Madison and a career world languages teacher, uses comparative vertical case study analysis to examine world language education in the United States and Poland since the Cold War. Eric, a former Fulbright fellow, trained as a social historian and is active in the Madison sister-city movement. In summer 2014, both taught English to Polish students in Bożków, an economically-challenged hamlet in Lower Silesia as part of WIESCO the Wisconsin Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization. They are keen on sharing their varied experiences obtained during a time of economic growth and political ferment in Poland – exactly one quarter century after the fall of Communism and coincident with the unfolding crisis in Ukraine.

About the Lecture: In the twenty-five years since the collapse of Communism & the long-deferred re-introduction of democracy to Poland, Poles have been working to build a new society free from a half century of totalitarian limits on personal achievement and eager to benefit fully from their fledgling membership in the European Union and NATO. In this, they have embraced English language learning, conducted via a well-established people-to-people language camp program from Wisconsin, as a tool for democratization, economic growth and strategic integration with the West. This talk will put the practice of non-formal language learning into a socio-historical context centered on Poland, present the views and personal experiences of teachers, students, government educators, and other political and economic stake-holders on the value of strategic language learning, and reflect on the contemporary role(s) of everyday Americans from the heartland who are working with aspiring, for-ward looking Poles in dealing with existing challenges & emerging opportunities thru cross-cultural world language learning.

hired as housekeepers, nannies, and wet nurses in bourgeois
households. Here they were expected to act as paragons of
middle class propriety and yet, low wages and lack of support
networks prompted many to turn to part-time prostitution.
At the same time, "respectable" male professionals, members
of the Polish intelligentsia & even male university students.."

NEW INITIATIVES: • Sept. 17- Oct. 5 Bringing the *Forbidden* Art Exhibit to Madison was a major accomplishment. Thank you to all who worked to make it happen in a short time, and to those who made financial contributions. At the Sept. 17 UW Memorial Union Porter Butts Gallery opening reception, over 100 attendees listened to talks by UW-Madison Professor Rachel Brenner of the Center for Jewish Studies, and JJ Przewozniak, Polish Mission of the Orchard Lake Schools. The traveling exhibit is presented in North America by The Polish Mission in exclusive partnership with the Auschwitz-Birkenau State Museum. Press coverage of the exhibit included interviews with Club President Joanna Pasowicz, and Diane Michalski Turner, co-chair with Marge Morgan of the Forbidden Art Committee. Press covering the exhibit: UW-Madison student newspapers The Daily Cardinal and Badger Herald, 77 Square Arts Picks, Wisconsin State Journal, Madison Area Neighbors, Isthmus, Channel 27- WKOW, Arts Extract, MODA Madison, and WORT-Radio. Professor Brenner was interviewed on WORT and spoke at a University League event. The Daily Cardinal chose the exhibit as a Fall semester highlight: "Artwork's power lies in its ability to remember the past."
