who was raised to the rank of archpriest, and installed as the rector of Protection of the Holy Virgin Mary Orthodox Church in Royalton, IL by Bishop Paul Gassios. The Bishop celebrated the Divine Liturgy to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the church. It was founded by Slavic people who emmigrated from the Carpathian Mountain region of Eastern Europe - N. Slovakia, S. Poland, W. Ukraine and Belarus - to work in the coal mines. In 1914, about five blocks from the church, 13 members of the church were among the 52 who died in the Franklin Coal and Coke Company Mine explosion. Fred and Carol Janeček are current and long-time PHCWI members who moved to southern Illinois this past summer.

Polish Culture A Rich History of Dance and Literature

2014 Scholarship Essay by Claire Wisniewski

Polish culture in general is really important to my life. For example, two aspects of Polish culture that directly relate to my life are dance and literature. Learning more about Polish dance can enrich my knowledge of the culture. By studying Polish literature, I can broaden my knowledge of global struggles for peace and justice.

I have always loved dancing. At each wedding and family gettogether on my mom's side of the family, we have danced the polka. It is not a very elaborate dance, but it is what people think of when they think of Polish people and Poland. However, the polka is not a uniquely Polish dance. It is done in a number of different countries in Europe.

There are many traditional dances that are more characteristic of Poland. There are five main national dances. These dances were created from the 15th century through the 19th century. At least two of the dances' rhythms inspired the composer Chopin. All of these dances have something to do with the culture and surroundings in Poland. Each have a different style of dress and different dance moves.

The first is the Polonaise, which traditionally opened up balls and weddings. The nobility dances this dance in a slow, formal walking style. People usually dress in costumes of the Polish nobility of the 17th century. It is also danced today as the opening for proms in Poland, something that rarely happens in the U.S.

The Kujawiak alternates between slow and fast. Both the nobility and peasants have added various steps to the dance and as a result it has many spinning turns and elaborate gestures. This is usually danced in a circle.

The Mazur is a quicker dance, also danced by the Polish nobility. It started in the Mazowsze region of Poland in the 16th century, then spread to the other regions by the 17th century. It has many intricate steps and it can be danced in different styles. It can either be danced in a delicate style or a militaristic style and you can even find it in opera.

The Oberek, another fast paced dance, became popular in almost all regions of Poland. It also originated in the Mazowsze region of Poland in the 17th century. It has lots of turns and twirls and lifts of both men and women. (It also happens to be my favorite dance.)

The Krakowiak is a quicker dance often danced in groups. These groups will dance in intricate formations like stars. The steps include the clicking and shuffling of feet. It originated in Krakow, Poland's capital in the 16th century. It is also the dance that [is] most identified with Poland.

Not only do I love dancing, I have always been curious about history and where people come from. In Poland, it is not just about the dancing, but about the food, clothing, and customs that accompany the dancing. My Busia has an outfit from Poland that you would see someone wear when dancing the Krakowiak. In Polish culture, they put beadwork and intricate

stitching on the dresses and shoes. My mother talks about the Polish hair-braiding contests she had to endure as a child.

I am lucky I get to experience Polish culture vicariously through my relatives. Today Polish people and culture have blended into mainstream American culture. It is important to recognize that America has many cultures. I come from a very multicultural family with Polish relatives but also German, Japanese, Norwegian, and Indian relatives. I get to participate in all of these by celebrating the different traditions through food, dance, and styles of dress. It is really fun to be able to contribute the Polish traditions to this mix of family traditions.

One way I can do this is by learning the different Polish dances. At weddings and other holidays, we do the polka but I would really like to learn the other dances so that I can bring more Polish culture to the family.

Intellectually, I am also interested in learning more about Polish literature. Goodreads, a website devoted to current literature, has a list of Polish authors. In fact, there have been 5 Polish winners of the Nobel Prize for literature. These writers have all written about the social and political upheaval that has been constant in Poland's history. This did not stop them from writing about what they believed in. "This is the heart of the country's cultural heritage: perseverance, an unbending desire to create and the belief that the pen is mightier than the sword." (Zubek).

An example of a Polish writer who inspires me is Wislawa Szymborska. In 1996, the same year I was born, she won the Nobel Prize for Literature. Many of her poems deal with issues of war and terrorism. She is just one person in a very long and rich tradition of Polish literature. I hope to expand my knowledge of Polish literature because there is a broad range of it that relates to my passion for social justice.

Polish culture plays a big part in my personal and family life. Both dance and literature have strong roots in Polish culture. I am able to celebrate this through the traditions that we uphold in my family and through my personal values. These values include passion about social justice and artistic expression.

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My Polish Ancestry

Ever since I was a little girl, I have called my only grandma Busia. My grandma and my mom are both Polish and grew up in a Polish neighborhood in Chicago. I am neither of these by blood because I was adopted when I was a baby. However, I know that I am Polish in my values and traditions.

As a kid, my mom would say things like "thank you" (dziękuję), "get over here" (chodź tutaj) and "give me a kiss" (daj mi buzi) in Polish. Every Easter, we engage in Polish traditions like decorating Easter eggs, making lamb cake, and having the Easter basket blessed.

On Christmas Eve (Wigilia), Polish traditions are central. We get together with my mom's relatives and eat pierogi that my Busia makes, and fish instead of meat. At the beginning of the meal, Busia, as the oldest person at the table, breaks the Christmas wafer (Oplatek) with the next oldest person, usually my uncle, and everyone makes good wishes for each other. We believe that whatever happens on Wigilia represents how the rest of the year will go.


With a last name like Wisniewski, I often have people ask me whether or not I am Polish or know someone with a similar last name. Whenever this happens, I am able to say yes because of the family traditions I will carry forward in my life.

Career Plans

My educational plans are to attend Knox College in Galesburg, Illinois. It is a four-year liberal arts college. One of my favorite things about Knox is that it encourages students to explore what they feel passionate about and to create their own career path. My favorite subjects are English, History, and Biology. I am curious about the way things work, I love being outside, I value the importance of our environment, and I enjoy expressing myself through poetry.

At Knox, I plan to explore these passions to find a career that allows me to use my gifts and talents to learn more about social and environmental justice and to better the world. I also plan to gain more volunteer experiences in these areas over the summer and while at college.

My visits to Knox have convinced me that this is a good choice for me because they encourage each student to grow emotionally as well as academically.

"This class introduces students to the dramatic history of modern Eastern Europe, a place where imperialism, Nazism, genocide, Communism, democracy, and capitalism were experienced in quick succession. While recognizing that Eastern Europe was in some ways distinct, we'll make connections with wider trends in Europe and around the world, from discussions of ethnic diversity before World War II to the revolutions of 1968 in the U.S. and France, as well as in Czechoslovakia and Poland. To bring these stories to life, students explore a range of exciting primary & secondary sources.... memoirs, film, oral histories, literature, photographs, music. The course revolves around three interrelated themes.....the causes, nature, and consequences of war in the region, from WWI through the bloody collapse of Yugoslavia in the 1990s. Finally, we'll focus on the role of society and discover how ordinary people including workers, peasants, women, and children experienced attempts to change the region, & how they shaped history through their everyday lives. The class will conclude with an exploration of how the transition to a post-Communist system posed new challenges across the region and how Eastern Europeans continue to wrestle with the ghosts of their past."



Joseph Liebe had acquired three forties under the Homestead Act of 1862, in what is now the town of Alban. Town of New Hope records show that John Domaszek and John Giodowski were tax-payers in 1868. Because of their affiliation with the church, Polonia continued to be their commercial and social center. By 1890, it is estimated that nearly 60 Polish families lived in the Rosholt area. In response to a call by the bishop to provide a parochial school education for the children, a school society was organized to build and staff a school. The school, located just W. of Rosholt, opened in 1895. In 1898, a parish under the patronage of St. Adalbert opened its doors......On August 23 and 24, in 1976, Cardinal Karol Wojtyla, archbishop of Krakow, Poland, paid a visit to Portage County. The cardinal was in the U.S. to attend the International Eucharistic Congress in Philadelphia. Although on a tight schedule, he accepted the invitation of Waclaw Soroka and Annual Lectures on Poland to come to the area. Included among his many activities was time spent with the Felician nuns in Polonia and a visit to the Rosholt area farm of Maynard and Mary Jane Zdroik. The future Pope John Paul II had expressed delight at the opportunity to travel into the rural area and to meet with the people."
