



Dr. Wacław Szybalski is Professor Emeritus of Oncology and an eminent scholar in the fields of molecular genetics at the McArdle Laboratory for Cancer Research of the University of Wisconsin in Madison, WI. Dr. Szybalski's contributions to medical science over the past sixty years have been extraordinary and his scientific achievements have merited at least one Nobel Prize in the view of his colleagues, some of whom have been Nobel Prize winners themselves. Among his many honors over the years, Dr. Szybalski has received Honorary Doctoral Degrees from five Polish universities... the UW Hilldale Award and the Grand Cross of the Order of Polonia Restituta from President Komorowski in 2011 for his "extraordinary and distinguished service." Dr. Szybalski was born in 1921 and educated as Ch.E. in Lwów. He lived through six years of the inhumane Soviet-Russian and Nazi-German WWII occupations of his homeland and found his way to the United States in 1950. His research in molecular biology commenced soon after at the Genetics Laboratory at Cold Spring Harbor, New York. One of his primary research collaborators was his late wife, Elizabeth Hunter Szybalska. Teresa Jankowski - District Commissioner Polish National Alliance fraternal for WI and MNand Director of PAC-WI. Jose Perez - Alderman for District 12 in Milwaukee, Gloria and Jim Shire - dedicated volunteers, <u>University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee Libraries</u> - Roman Kwasniewski Photographic Collection, and the American Geographic Society (AGS) collection historic maps of Poland.

2014 Wigilia Story: A Christmas to Remember

Story shared at our club's 2014 Wigilia by Rev. Ralph Tyksinski.. He served on our Board of Directors, regularly helps at club events with his wife Karleen, and they wrote about their Poland trip in the M/A 2012 newsletter.

It was a snowy December, and Christmas (December 25th) came during midweek, (1947 or 1948). The public schools in Chicago let out for the holidays just a day before Christmas Eve and our family's Wigilia celebration. I had two older brothers, Billy and Terry, and a younger sister, Dawn. Our mother had given all of us assigned chores to complete. Floors had to be scrubbed, bedrooms and bath room spotlessly cleaned, and dining room table and chairs dusted and waxed - all done to make ready for the setting up the Christmas tree in the living room, and completing the preparations for the Christmas Eve customs done in our bungalow home on Chicago's Northwest side.

The telephone rang around 5:30 pm and it was Dad calling Mom. After she hung up, she called everyone into the dining room. "Dad can't get a Christmas tree home because he's still working on a refrigeration repair job in the Loop. He probably won't be home until after 8:00 pm." She turned to Billy and said, "Would you take Terry and Ralph and go down to Cicero Ave. and pick out a nice tree for us at one of those Christmas tree lots?"

It was dark and cold outside. There was still snow on the streets from a mid-December snowstorm. We put on our winter coats and pulled on our galoshes. As we left Mom gave Bill money to buy a tree. The streets had very few cars running on them as Billy, Terry and I took off pulling a sled to find a tree lot still open on Christmas Eve. "I saw a lot on Cicero and Addison when I came home on the bus from school yesterday," Billy said. That's where we headed.

Three blocks latter we arrived to find a dark and empty lot. Billy said, "Let's go down Cicero toward Waveland. I saw a small lot there when I was delivering groceries last week." In a few minutes we arrived to find another dark and empty lot. Just a bunch of branches piled up in mound with a lot of needles on the snow covered ground. "Let's go down to Warwick", Billy said. Off we went. When we arrived we saw a similar scene. A dark and what seemed an empty lot.

But as we surveyed the darkness there seemed to be a mound piled at the far back end of the empty lot. We went back to discover three trees piled on each other. We each picked one up and stood them straight in the dim light from a nearby street lamp. Billy said, "Let's take them back to the house. I think we can make one nice one out of these three scrawny ones."

When we got back to our home, Billy went to our Dad's tool shop in our garage and came back carrying a large drill, a good sized drill bit, a saw, and a sharp cutting knife. Terry held up the tallest tree. I held up the two smaller trees. Billy went to work. In short order he cut branches from the two shorter trees and drilled holes in the tallest tree held up by Terry. Soon it became a fuller and nicely shaped tree. We carefully inserted it into the metal tree stand. There it stood, straight and almost 8 ft. tall. Mom came out to the back porch and exclaimed, "Oh my, that's beautiful!! Take it around to the front door and let's put it in the living room."

Soon we had the tree decorated with lights, ornaments, and tinsel. A toy village was set up under the tree and our Lionel train was set up on tracks that encircled the tree. When Dad got home after 8:30 pm we sat down around our dining room table to partake of our Wigilia meal that Mom had been preparing all day. Later in the evening my Uncle Jack, who lived next door, came by to wish us a *Wesolych Swiat*.

I burst out and told him our story of how we found three scraggly trees on an empty tree lot on Cicero and Warwick, and how Billy cut and drilled holes in the tallest and made one beautiful tree out three. Uncle Jack was very quick witted. He chuckled and said, "You might want to call that your Trinity tree, out of three came one." We all laughed a joyful laugh. A Merry Christmas was had by all that year.
