

Phyllis Noble Nov 27, 1942 - May 31, 2017

from obit: "Phyllis Noble passed away, brought down by the only force that could stop her spirit - the demon cancer." Phyllis grew up with her mother and Polish immigrant grandparents in NW Chicago. She graduated from Loyola, the first person in her family to get a college degree. After two years teaching English with the Peace Corps in Nigeria, she worked in Chicago. In Madison she taught U.S. Citizenship and English as a Second Language classes. "Then upon retirement she got busy" singing with the Raging Grannies, volunteering with the WI Medical Project, Returned Peace Corps Volunteers - and with our Club at the Spring Festival and Bazaar.

Linda Cagle: "At the first PHCWI Christmas Bazaar I volunteered for at the West Side Club, at the last minute, I was asked to move to the other checkout...and there I met Phyllis. She was so friendly and had a great sense of humor - it was non-stop conversation the entire day. I paint, and she wanted to know if I "do windows" replace old glaze around windows. I said I'd be glad to help - it was an older 2-story house with over 25 windowsbut I love a challenge! We had many laughs over this project, and when I painted her condo. I was about to paint again when she discovered she had cancer, but would wait until she returned from her travels. By that time, Hospice was involved and I never did get to see what color she wanted this time. Phyllis was a free spirit. I will miss her."

Phyllis's family story in our May 2016 newsletter: "My maternal grandmother, Maria Bienia Szelć Kosinska, was born on a farm in Krosno, Poland, in 1876. In 1905, she was a 29-year-old widow with two step-children and two children of her own. She did not have enough land to grow enough food to feed her little family by herself. When she left Poland to come to America, her plan was to make enough money in two years to return to Krosno and buy more land. Sadly, she never was able to return, not even to visit."

At our club's 35th Anniversary in October 2015, Phyllis displayed CERAMIC FIGURES and WEAVINGS by Polish artisans that she purchased at the Chicago Art Institute over 35 years ago.

Eat: 5-7 pm, Ride: 7-9 pm, Polka 9-11 pm *Where:* Wayward Kitchen, 1407 S 1st St, (right under the always full Polish Moon), the Clocktower in hip Walker's Point Neighborhood. *How far:* 8 miles of slow, easy pedaling with plenty of rest stops to regroup. Capped at 1,000 riders. Takes 1½-2 hrs.

"... a unique, family-friendly bike tour through Milwaukee's historic Polish neighborhoods. The easy, slow roll through the real "Streets of Old Milwaukee" honors the area's Polish and German history while it celebrates the present-day Latino culture. Be sure to bring the whole family for this ride. The pace and distance are slow enough for all ages and abilities, and the police keep everyone safe. Kids of all ages love the feeling of riding around on these historic streets of old Milwaukee as the sun sets!

Come hungry, because the Polish Moon Ride begins at 5 with delicious Polish and Mexican food. The grill masters from Ben's Cycle and Milwaukee Bicycle Co. will man the barbeque pit, featuring Klements Polish sausage on Sciortino's buns. Wayward Kitchen's talented Chef Tyler and will be serving amazing tacos and czarnina, made from an old family recipe. Of course we will have Purple Door ice cream as well as chocolate milk & more ice cream from our friends at Kemps! While you eat, MX Rudigo Norteño, one of Milwaukee's hottest norteña bands, will get you warmed up for the ride.

The police-led ride starts at 7pm with accordion players cranking out polka on the back of cargo bikes along the entire 8 mi. family-friendly ride. Be prepared to be amazed, as the crowd of people on bikes last year stretched 10 city blocks! This is a SLOW ride, so no need for spandex! There will also be lots of short stops along the route as the police hold us at intersections. We will have ride support in case you have a flat or mechanical trouble. Polish Pride Quilting ~ Gloria Welniak's Quilts

Wisconsin Sesquicentennial Quilt

On the occasion of the Sesquicentennial of the state of Wisconsin in 1998, the Prairie Heritage Quilters of Sun Prairie issued a call for quilt blocks that depicted some aspect of Wisconsin history and culture. PHCWI member Gloria Welniak designed a block with a Polish rooster wycinanki pattern and the words "Polish Heritage". Her sister Patty appliqued and sewed the block. It was one of 20 blocks chosen for the commemorative quilt, and the sisters won an award for one of the best blocks. The quilt was shown at various museums and shows in Wisconsin, and now is part of the permanent collection of the Sun Prairie Museum.



The quilt block was truly a labor of love of their Polish heritage. Their father emigrated from Wysoka, Poland in 1903 to Elyria, Nebraska and in 1920 married their mother, whose parents had emigrated from Poland in the 19th century. In 1940 the family settled on a farm in Marshfield, WI where the sisters grew up.



Wycinanki Roosters Revisited

This small wall quilt was made by Gloria in 2016 as a contemporary take on wycinanki and as a sample for a workshop on Polish crafts taught by Gloria.



Baba Jaga Spirit Doll

This doll was created by Gloria for the Silent Auction at the Polish Heritage Club's Spring Festival 2017. Though some consider Baba Jaga a witch, this modern Polish earth goddess is said to impart wisdom and gifts to the pure of heart. She wears a patchwork quilted skirt and amber pendant, and holds a white Polish eagle.
