

Mysteries of Mazurki Revealed

If we had ever thought making mazurki was beyond our capability, Irena Fraczek quickly and deftly put our minds at ease in a baking class on March 17. Not only did we gain confidence in the making of the traditional Polish Easter cake, we learned a great deal of Polish history and culture.

The word mazurek (singular) can have several meanings: a bird, a folk dance, residents of a region in Poland and the cake which is only made for Easter. In Poland, mazurki (plural) are baked in the home, usually not in a commercial bakery. Prepared on Good Friday, it is shared and eaten along with the contents of the Swieconka Basket after it is blessed on Holy Saturday and for breakfast on Easter Sunday.

Mazurki were first made for the Polish nobility using exotic dried fruits from the Middle East. Today fruit preserves, caramel, chocolate, marzipan, candied fruits and nuts are layered on a baked shortbread-like crust. Irena baked several rimmed oval, square and rectangular crusts, some decorated with pastry flowers and leaves. She lavishly layered each with different toppings: poppyseed filling, milk caramel, fruit preserves, chocolate, and nuts and finished with a lucre or powdered sugar frosting. A mazurek can be a beautiful, creative, and delicious Easter offering for family and friends.

Feb 28 The Political Consequences of Economic Shocks:Evidence from PolandMark Copelovitch, AssociateProfessor, La Follette School of Public Affairs:

"Using original survey data collected just prior to the 2015 Polish parliamentary elections and comparing current with past foreign exchange borrowers, Mark Copelovitch will show how economic shocks influence domestic politics.

A surprise revaluation of the Swiss franc in early 2015 provides the backdrop for identifying Polish citizens most directly exposed to the shock – those repaying mortgages dominated in Swiss francs. Copelovitch and his colleague at the University of Zurich also found that these people were much more likely to demand government support.

Current borrowers' preferences for a generous resolution scheme translated into distinct voting behavior. Among former government voters, Swiss franc borrowers were more likely to desert the government and vote for the largest opposition party, PiS, which promised the most generous bailout.

The evidence suggests that PiS was able to use the franc shock to expand its electoral coalition beyond its core voters to include those directly affected by the franc shock, a subgroup otherwise unlikely to support PiS. Simulation results indicate that absent the franc shock, PiS is unlikely to have won a parliamentary majority."

April 5 CONTEMPORARY POLAND AND THE JEWS

Geneviève Zubrzycki, Professor, Sociology, Ann Arbor "In spite of the Jewish community's small size in contemporary Poland, Jews occupy a large space in social imagination and political discourse in that country. Perhaps more than ever before, the Polish public sphere is shaped by both anti- and philo-Semitic discourse, public initiatives and private actions. How can we make sense of the ongoing "Jewish revival," and the resurgence of state-sponsored anti-Semitic historical policies such as the recent "Holocaust law"? In asking this and other questions, Zubrzycki will examine these diverse processes and show how they are related to debates about the redefinition of Polish national identity.

Geneviève Zubrzycki is Professor of Sociology and Director of the Weiser Center for Europe and Eurasia at the University of Michigan. She studies national identity and religion, collective memory and national mythology, and the contested place of religious symbols in the public sphere. She's the author of the award-winning books *The Crosses of Auschwitz: Nationalism and Religion in Post-Communist Poland (2006, Polish trans. 2014)* and *Beheading the Saint: Nationalism, Religion and Secularism in Quebec (2016)*, and the editor of *National Matters: Materiality, Culture, and Nationalism (2017)*. Zubrzycki pursues her analysis of religion, secularism, and memory in a new monograph, tentatively entitled *Antisemitism, Philosemitism and the Politics of Memory in Contemporary Poland*.

April 12 WHY POLAND MATTERS: SOURCES OF RADICAL RIGHT POWER IN EASTERN EUROPE AND THE WORLD

David Ost, Professor, Political Science, Hobart William Smith

"In its third year of power, Poland's far right Law and Justice party enjoys greater public support than ever before. Where other far right parties have alienated large numbers of citizens, has Law and Justice found a way to make "fascism" acceptable again? With policies including family benefits, enforced labor laws, higher wages for the working poor, along with a government takeover of the courts, state promotion of racism, and fanatic nationalism, Law and Justice harks back to classical notions of "national socialism," with the modern twist of allowing an opposition to exist (though with restrictions limiting its capacities). Can it work? What are the conditions for its success? Why is the party so difficult to challenge? Can it be replicated by Trump or in western Europe? The far right no longer just threatens to take power. In Poland and Hungary it already has, even while it faces critics even further to the right. Its model, moreover, is applicable elsewhere, including the United States. Poland helps us understand the sources of the far right's new strength, and provides hints as to its potential weaknesses.

David Ost is the Joseph DiGangi Professor of Political Science at Hobart and William Smith College. He has written widely on eastern European politics and society, with a focus on political economy, democratization, capitalism, and labor. Ost is the author of several books on communist and postcommunist society, including The Defeat of Solidarity: Anger and Politics in Postcommunist Society, which received the Ed Hewett award for Best Book in Political Economy. In addition, his essays have been published in a number of scholarly and popular journals including Politics and Society, European Journal of Social Theory, East European Politics and Society, European Journal of Industrial Relations, and The Nation.

April 19 NUCLEAR POWER AND THE ARROGANCE OF MAN: REVISITING THE CHERNOBYL DISASTER Serhii Plokhii, Mykhailo Hrushevsky Professor of Ukrainian History, Harvard

On the morning of April 26, 1986, the world witnessed the worst nuclear disaster in history: the explosion of a reactor at the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant in Soviet Ukraine. Dozens died of radiation poisoning, fallout contaminated half the continent, and thousands fell ill. In his lecture, Serhii Plokhii draws on new sources to lay bare the flaws of the Soviet nuclear industry, tracing the disaster to the authoritarian character of Communist party rule, the regime's control of scientific information, and its emphasis on economic development over all else. Today, the risk of another Chernobyl, claims Plokhii, looms in the mismanagement of nuclear power in the developing world.

Serhii Plokhii is the Mykhailo Hrushevsky Professor of Ukrainian History and the director of the Ukrainian Research Institute at Harvard University. His interests include intellectual, cultural and international history of Eastern Europe. A leading authority on the region, he has published extensively in English, Ukrainian and Russian. Plokhii is the author of several influential monographs, including, Lost Kingdom: The Quest for Empire and the Making of the Russian Nation (New York, 2017). His newest book, Chernobyl: The History of a Nuclear Catastrophe - May 2018 release by Basic Books.

Maria Pomianowska is an outstanding multi-instrumentalist, vocalist, composer, teacher and promoter of Polish classical and folk music. Trained as a classical cellist, she is also a master sarangi player cultivating her interests in the music of Far East Asia as professor of the Academy of Music in Kraków - where she opened the first in Poland *Faculty of Ethno-Music*. She is also director of the Cross-Culture Warsaw Festival and organizer of multi-cultural music programs around the world.

During her concert in Madison, Maria played two unique and long forgotten Polish instruments - a *suka biłgorajska* and a *fidel płocka*. These and similar knee-supported fiddles were used in Poland since the X century and some see them as the Polish precursors of the modern violin. In particular, *suka biłgorajska* went out of use sometime in the XIX century and with not even one copy of the instrument surviving until modernity. It was reconstructed based on the

Pomianowska also developed for the instrument a fingernail playing technique similar to that of sarangi. Dozens of these instruments exist now in various sizes and Maria with her allwomen group "ReBorn" popularized it in the most recent of her 23 recordings "The Voice of Suka."

"Classical guitarist Paweł Kuźma was born in 1985 in Piekary Śląskie, Poland. He is currently an adjunct professor at The American University in Cairo where he teaches World Music and private applied guitar. Along with composer Bahaa El Ansary, Kuzma co-directs Cairo Impro, a group dedicated to the education and performance of avant-garde improvisation. As a performing artist, Pawel has given many concerts in Poland, Finland, Germany, Czech Republic, Austria and Egypt.

His passion for classical guitar started in his first year of primary school. At the beginning of his musical education, Pawel won many national music competitions. Later, he won international competitions and grants from the Polish Ministry of Culture and City Council.

Considered by many to be one of the most promising guitarists in Poland, Pawel graduated from high school with honors. Pawel continued his education at the Szymanowski Music Academy in Katowice, Poland. There, he studied under the renowned professor, Alina Gruszka. During this time, Pawel was awarded a grant by Young Poland, an organization founded by Ministry of Culture.

After graduating from the Szymanowski Academy, Pawel moved to Finland to continue his education at the Sibelius Academy in Helsinki, which is widely considered to be one of the best music programs in the world. He studied under Dr. Jukka Savijoki. Pawel became co-director of CGC in fall 2017."
