

April 22 FRANKLIN, WI - The Polish Center

"1979-1989 – Living through Poland's Extraordinary Decade" The Wisconsin State Division of the Polish American Congress and the Polish Heritage Alliance sponsored the discussion moderated by Dr. Donald Pienkos. Memories were shared by Irena Fraczek, Eugene Kaluzny, Jaroslaw Mielczarek, Hedy Moskaluk, Katarzyna Murawska and Derek Zarzeczny.

"In May 1979, Pope John Paul II made his very first visit to his homeland after his election as head of the Roman Catholic Church. Just a year later the Solidarity trade union movement was born in Gdansk. In December 1981, the communist regime imposed martial law on the country and suppressed Solidarity. The years after were very hard on Poland's people. Finally in 1989 the regime, Solidarity and the Church agreed on limited but free elections for Poland, elections Solidarity won in resounding fashion. Within a few months communist rule had come to a non-violent end and a new democratic Poland had been born. It was truly an amazing decade!"

• <u>Sean Pharr, Mint Mark 1929 Winnebago St</u>: "...their prep cooks normally make 5 dozen filled pierogi every morning to keep up with the nightly demand. 'When we first opened, we offered pierogi filled with smoked potato, gruyere and mushrooms, served on a bed of red cabbage braised in wine... incredibly popular. When we're a little further into the summer season I'm planning to try a filling with fresh peas and potatoes...Then maybe we'll add some curry ..."

• <u>Laila Borokhim, nuuNoosh 1431 Regent St</u>: "In the colder months, [she] fills them with mashed potatoes and a blend of cheddar and a Polish white cheese, similar to farmer's cheese, which she sources in Chicago. Simmered in borscht (beet) broth, the dumplings take on a pink hue... Everyone loves them!' This summer she's considering a slightly lighter version, appropriate for the restaurant's sunny patio."

Mateusz Smoczynski is probably the most interesting and accomplished jazz violinists on Polish music scene today. He has been performing and recording for over ten years with multiple groups in Poland and abroad. He finally released his first solo CD called "Metamorphoses" last year. Mateusz describes his solo set as a crossover music - between jazz, classical and little bit of bluegrass. He uses loops to add a violin rhythm part during his live performances (see a 3rd UT link) Prior to that, he recorded three CDs with his own jazz group -Mateusz Smoczynski Quintet, two CDs with the New Trio (founded with his brother Jan), as well as five CDs with the Atom String Quartet - first ever Polish jazz string group which he co-founded in 2009. Feb 14 New York - Violinist Anna Karkowska 36, died of breast cancer. In 2009 and 2010 she and her sister Kasha performed in Ladysmith, West Bend, Oconto Falls, Richland Center and Milwaukee. A 2009 MILWAUKEE JOURNAL SENTINEL story titled "Pianist, violinist sisters put on a polished show" told of their Wisconsin Lutheran College program of classical favorites and traditional Polish music: "Both sisters are virtuoso artists, and they have a penchant for entertaining too: their concerts feature storytelling and light, sisterly banter interspersed with their bright, precise playing for an all-round stage performance." Anna's 2010 YouTube videos ...were filmed during Abbey Road recording sessions with the London Symphony Orchestra... She was known for her "unorthodox style, featuring a broad vibrato and extravagant portamentos, [which] excited much debate online..." www.karkowskaduo.org/index.html

The British composer, musicologist, pianist, and author - of around eighty film scores, symphonic and chamber music works, operas and music to the videogame Enemy Zero - will solo with his suite from the Oscar-winning film *The Piano*.

"Wojciech Kilar (1932-2013) was a founder of the school of avant-garde music in the early 1960s.

In the 1970s he began to use a simplified musical idiom, turning to tradition and looking for inspiration in folk music and religion. In many works he attempted to revive a national style in Polish music. The folk music of the Tatras and the Tatra foothills inspired Kilar in works such as *Kościelec 1909, Grey Mist, Orawa* and, first and foremost, *Krzesany*, his most popular orchestral piece performed with much success all over the world. Kilar wrote soundtracks for more than 150 films. He collaborated with many top Polish directors, including Krzysztof Kieślowski, Andrzej Wajda, Krzysztof Zanussi and Kazimierz Kutz...and with prominent foreign directors..." www.thenews.pl/1/11/Artykul/337350.British-composer-wins-prestigious-Polish-award


